

Grand Canyon Wolf Recovery Project accomplishments in 2013:

- Gave an invited presentation to over 150 people on Mexican wolves of the Southwest as part of the “Furry Creatures of the Colorado Plateau” lecture series for the Museum of Northern Arizona in Sedona.
- Hosted the Wild and Scenic Film Festival on tour in Flagstaff, AZ for an audience of over 300 people. This was our biggest audience to date! Please save the date for our 5th Annual Wild & Scenic Film Festival and silent auction on Friday, March 28th, 2014.
- Hosted 85 participants in our first Big Lake Howliday Campout Weekend! Participants included many individual wolf advocates and also representatives from the National Wolfwatcher Coalition, Lobos of the Southwest, Wolf Conservation Center, the Arizona Wildlife Tracking Club, Great Old Broads for Wilderness, Defenders of Wildlife, the White Mountain Apache Tribe, the Sierra Club – Grand Canyon Chapter, the Animal Defense League of Arizona, and several staff biologists from the Arizona Game and Fish Department.
- Conducted wolf outreach tables, speaking with over 2,500 people at events including the Flagstaff Earth Day Celebration, Flagstaff Hullabaloo, the Museum of Northern Arizona, a weekend at the North Rim of the Grand Canyon, and Save the Lobo event in Albuquerque.



- Provided school programs on wolves for over 250 students at regional schools, including, the Mountain School, Mount Elden Middle School, the Montessori Middle School, Coconino High School, Flagstaff Arts and Leadership Academy, Prescott College, and the Northern Arizona University Student Chapter of the Wildlife Society.
- Hosted several comment-writing sessions and supported the public in submitting over 10,000 comments on the proposed rule changes for Mexican wolves to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

- Hosted standing-room only audiences for presentations and book signings by author and expert wildlife tracker, David Moskowitz about his book *Wolves in the Land of Salmon*, and Dr. Cristina Eisenberg who spoke about her research on deer, elk, aspen, and wolves and her book: *The Wolf's Tooth: Keystone Predators, Trophic Cascades, and Biodiversity* as part of the Flagstaff Festival of Science.
- Assisted numerous volunteers to carpool to and testify for wolves at a public hearings held by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Albuquerque, NM and Pinetop, AZ.
